

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## About the School



The SoN has played a crucial role in terms of community service activities and post-registration education through specialized nursing courses. In addition, several members from the SoN have participated in establishing new schools of nursing inside Jordan and in some of the neighboring countries. Over the past years, the SoN has witnessed a steady expansion and growth and is now considered the Foremost of all schools of Nursing in the country.



Students are trained in all types of health care organizations including, in addition to Jordan

University Hospital, public and private hospitals, health centers, schools and the community in addition to the well-equipped simulation laboratories.

SoN highly values community service and national and international relations. At the local level, SoN has strong relations with (to name few) the Jordanian Nursing Council (JNC), the Jordanian Nurses and Midwives Council (JNMC), the Higher Population Council, the High Health Council (HHC), several NGOs

and all health care institutions and organizations. The school has several agreements and MOUs with schools of nursing abroad –in the USA, Europe, and Sweden. Teacher and student exchange

programs are given great importance. Students, supervised and accompanied by their teachers provide community services in the form of health campaigns, health education and awareness raising campaigns, care of elderly homes, children with special needs and other vulnerable groups.




The school has undertaken the

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



To be a leading, global school in the areas of nursing education, research, and community services.




### **Our Mission**



The SON has there administrative departments; the Clinical Nursing includes 4 sections: Foundations of Professional Nursing, Health Assessment, Adult Health Nursing 1, and Adult Health Nursing 2. Maternal and Child Health Department has 2 sections: Maternal Health Nursing and Child and Adolescence Health Nursing, and Community Health Nursing department has 3 sections: Mental Health Nursing, Community Health Nursing, and Management and Leadership in Nursing. These sections, headed by faculty course coordinators hold regular separate meetings to organize clinical practice schedules, exams, students' assignments, rotations and clinical settings, for purposes of bridging theory and practice.

1. **Clinical Nursing Department:** receives students in their first, second, and third year of study. It provides them with basic knowledge, attitudes, and skills needed in the areas of foundation of nursing, caring of adult clients, and caring of critically ill. The students are prepared to practice nursing starting from the lab and ending in specialized care units.

### • Bachelor of Science:

The baccalaureate program prepares competent, self-directed, independent, and safe practitioner and generalist (Registered Nurses) who can assume increasing responsibility and leadership in the delivery of evidence-based nursing care.

#### • Master of Science:

The Graduate program offers a Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) with preparation as a clinical nurse specialist in the areas of Critical Care, Palliative Care and Psychiatric-Mental Health. Master's nursing education builds on a foundation of undergraduate nursing education and provides specialty practice with an expanded theoretical and empirical knowledge base.

The Master of Science in Clinical Nursing in its three specialties:






#### • Doctor of Philosophy


